

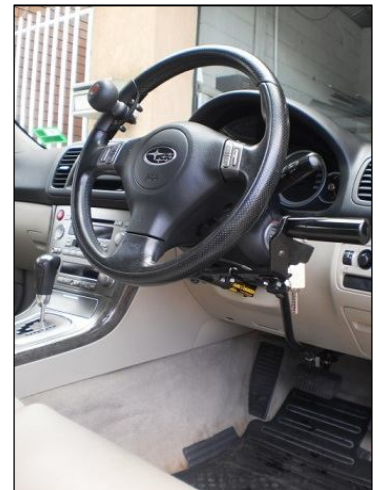
WHEN SHOULD I MAKE A REFERRAL FOR AN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DRIVER ASSESSMENT?

An Occupational Therapy Driver Assessment may become necessary because:



- Your physical, cognitive or visual skills may have changed since first obtaining your licence
- You have sustained a physical injury, head injury, illness, disability, stroke or psychiatric disorder which may affect your ability to drive

- You recently suffered a medical illness or condition, and your doctor has requested an Occupational Therapy Driver Assessment to determine the impact of the condition on your ability to drive safely
- You have medical condition or disability and would like to know if you are able to obtain a driver licence
- You have a deteriorating or progressive medical condition and require ongoing reviews to monitor your ability to drive
- You experience physical limitations and may require vehicle modifications or assistive equipment to help control the vehicle safely and legally, and help you to continue or commence driving
- You have issues with pain and fatigue, and are unable to tolerate driving for long periods
- To determine work related driving capacity to assist with your return to work
- You would benefit from an ergonomic assessment to help determine best driving posture



- You have concerns about a loved one's ability to drive safely, as they are experiencing issues such as: confusion on familiar routes; disorientation; difficulty maintaining correct road position; problems with vision, hearing, reaction time or problem solving; clumsiness or uncoordinated movement
